- ☑ We struggled to find some of our students but with the help of lecturers, student leaders, fellow classmates, and administrative staff we found **29 100 of our 29 462 students** and gave them the opportunity to restart their learning and they are steadily progressing to complete the year.
- ☐ The success rate for the 1st semester was **79%**, which was slightly higher than the 2019 semester 1 success rate.
- ✓ Of these, **1526 will complete the 2020AY** when they graduate in a virtual ceremony on 17 and 18 December
- ☑ The teaching in the semester 2 modules is close to completion, while in January and February we will focus on module assessments and experiential learning

How did this happen?

It took courage, determination, and grit for:

- Students to adapt to online learning and e-assessment – often in very challenging circumstances where some students literally climbed mountains to get a signal or battled to learn using a cellphone.
- Lecturers to shift to teaching and assessing online, and to work long hours to be able to connect with students who had more data at night.
- The University to provide students with data and loan laptops.
- The University staff to put health and safety protocols in place when students could return to campus to do mask-to-mask experiential learning and online learning in COVID-19 compliant venues and labs.

We are all happy about the progress made but are also quite exhausted. It is time to rest for a few weeks. We hope that you enjoy spending time with your families. But remember to mask-up, sanitise and practice social distancing so that you and your family stay healthy.
